














# Available at Patty's Plants

Certified Organic Tomatoes		
Beam's Yellow Pear		Indeterminate. Productive plants absolutely loaded with clusters of 1-2" pear-shaped fruits. Mild, meaty fruits perfect in salads, for snacking or drying. 70-80 days from transplant.
Black Cherry		Indeterminate. Finally, a cherry tomato with the characteristic full, smoky, complex flavors of the black tomatoes. Small 1" round fruits are more mahogany or dark pink than black, but are shiny and beautiful - they almost glisten in the sun! Very productive plants. 70-80 days from transplant.
Black Krim		Indeterminate. Green-shouldered mahogany fruits have the most deliciously-complex, sweet-smoky-salty flavor we've ever encountered. Great producer that excels in cooler weather. 75-80 days from transplant.
Brandywine		Indeterminate. Possibly the best tomato available. Large pink beefsteak fruits average 1+ pounds, and are sweet, juicy, and full of refreshing flavor. This is the heirloom tomato to which all others are compared, and no tomato garden is complete without it. 85 days from transplant
Celebrity		Determinate. Great disease and crack resistance in an all-purpose variety. Globe-shaped fruits average 8 oz, with full flavored, thick red flesh. Good balance of acid and sweet. Productive determinate plants are resistant to almost every tomato disease and need little staking. 75 days from transplant.
Cherry Roma Grape		Indeterminate. Large clusters of small, grape-shaped fruits full of sweet, spicy flavor. Great for snacking, salads, and drying. The best, most productive grape tomato they've ever grown, and the most requested of all the tomatoes they sold last year. 70-80 days from transplant.
Garden Peach		Indeterminate. If you could refer to any tomato variety as being fun, this would be it. 2 oz yellow fruits are ripe when blushed with peach. Their seed stock comes from Fedco Seeds, who describes it as "delicate" and, "lightly fruity" tasting. They couldn't say it better - in fact it topped one of their own "back-yard tomato taste tests" 3 years ago. Productive, tolerant plants, and "fun" sweet, delicious fruits that keep well too. What more could you ask for? About 70 days from transplant.
Jersey Giant –Paste		The best paste tomato they've encountered. These very large pepper-shaped tomatoes have a sweet flesh that is firm, but not mushy like some roma types. Seeds are not commercially available, so they had to save seed from these nearly seedless fruits to be able to offer them to their customers. A later maturing variety at about 80-90 days, but once they start coming in, they just keep coming!
Kellogg's Breakfast		Or - as they like to call it - breakfast, lunch and dinner! These attractive orange beefsteak tomatoes are huge! All of the fruits we weighed were over 1lb, with most approaching or over 2 lbs! Bright sunshine-orange fruits are just awesome; sweet, rich, and full of real tomato flavor, which most of the orange tomatoes lack. Some fruits may exhibit green shoulders, a blemish here or there, or a blossom end scar, but the taste is well worth the minor imperfections.

<p><b>Mortgage Lifter</b> (Radiator Charlie's)</p>  <p>Mortgage Lifter</p>	<p><b>Indeterminate. For beefsteak lovers! Enormous, mild pink fruits often grow to 2 lbs. Great yields and few seeds. Developed in the 1930's by a man from West Virginia who paid off his mortgage by selling these fabulous fruits and plants - see the story below, copied from Slow Food USA. 80 days from transplant.</b></p> <p>This tomato was developed by M.C. Byles (went by Charlie) of Logan, West Virginia in the 1930s. Charlie owned a radiator repair shop and had no plant breeding experience - this tomato was the only breeding work he ever did. Charlie took 10 tomatoes and put them in a circle with a German Johnson tomato in the center. He collected pollen from the 10 outer tomatoes in a baby's ear syringe and then squirted it on the flowers of the German Johnson. After seven years he had a stable tomato with the qualities he wanted. He was a good marketer and sold his seedlings for \$1 each. After 6 years he was able to pay off the \$6,000 mortgage on his house. This tomato's story has helped keep the strain alive.</p>
<p><b>Rose de Berne</b></p> 	<p><b>Indeterminate. Fabulous French Heirloom boasts beautiful perfectly round pink fruits, with a rich, sweet almost fruity flavor. Productive and dependable - performed great in the drought of 2005, AND the wet, rainy season of 2006. A real winner. 80 days from transplant.</b></p>
<p><b>Speckled Roman</b></p> 	<p><b>Indeterminate. This is truly a beautiful tomato. 4-5 oz tapered red fruits have wavy orange/yellow stripes, and a deep red meaty yet juicy flesh. Great texture and few seeds, perfect for pastes and sauces, but also juicy enough for salads, sandwiches, and eating fresh. Flavor is sweet, full, and rich. Unique tomato developed not long ago by Northern Illinois' own John Swenson. 75-80 days from transplant</b></p>
<p><b>Stupice</b></p> 	<p><b>For those of you looking for a full-flavored early tomato! These picture-perfect small red fruits average 3-4 oz, but have a big tomato flavor. They start to ripen about 60-70 days after transplanting, and unlike many early types, bear heavily until frost.</b></p>
<p><b>Sunsugar Cherry</b></p> 	<p><b>Indeterminate. This hybrid golden cherry tomato has been winning tomato taste tests since its introduction. As the name implies, it is unbelievably sweet - perhaps the sweetest cherry tomato available. Plants are incredibly productive, with large clusters of small, crack resistant fruits all season. Dependable, disease-resistant, and somewhat early, with first fruits setting about 60 days from transplant.</b></p>
<p><b><u>Determinate</u></b>-These grow to a certain size and stop. They produce their tomatoes all at one time. Some don't need support. Good for canning.</p>	<p><b><u>Indeterminate</u></b>- If you want tomatoes all summer long these are the ones to choose. These tomatoes bear fruit continually up to harvest. They definitely need staking as they get very large.</p>
